HORSE SPORT IRELAND

As we look forward to the new breeding season, Irish Sport Horse Breeders can reflect on a very successful 2018 with the Irish Sport Horse Studbook winning Gold, Silver and Bronze medals at the World Breeding Federation for Sport Horses (WBFSH) Young Horse Show Jumping Championships in Lanaken. This is the first time ever that one studbook achieved this feat. At the World Equestrian Games for Eventing, three of the four silver medal winning team horses were Irish Sport Horses, which is a fantastic achievement.

The Irish Sport Horse breeding sector continues to be vibrant, however of particular concern is the significant number of Irish horses being registered without having their pedigree recorded. This is clearly a regressive step and one which will have long-term implications for all breeds, both from a breeding programme and economic value perspective. Horse Sport Ireland strongly urges all stakeholders to consider this situation carefully and the merits of all equines being registered with full pedigree in an approved equine studbook. Breeders should be aware of the sire and dam of their foal and the fact that opting for a white book devalues their foal and results in a substantial loss in information to the studbook and to the breeding sector in general.

Horse Sport Ireland continues to support specific breed improvement initiatives such as the Embryo Transfer Scheme for High Performance mares. This year a percentage of this money has been ring fenced for Traditional Irish Horse (TIH) bred mares to produce more high level TIH offspring.

In order to promote and preserve Ireland's rare Irish Draught bloodlines and the Traditional Irish Horse bred Irish Sport Horse stallions, Horse Sport Ireland has also implemented a scheme to freeze the semen from a selected number of these horses in 2019. This follows the completion of the report entitled Genetics of the Irish Draught Horse Stud Book of Origin, which profiled the Irish Draught breed and highlighted stallions and breeding lines of concern.

This latest edition of the HSI Breeder magazine is packed full of information to help you make your breeding decisions in 2019. While breeding always contains an element of chance, Irish breeders have proven repeatedly that they can compete with the best in the world. It is essential that all breeding programmes, both studbooks and individual, are based on solid breeding goals which are mindful of pedigree, performance and soundness of the product being produced. In this magazine, we have highlighted the significant decrease in the Thoroughbred influence in our foal crops in recent years. HSI has introduced specific schemes this year to encourage breeders to consider breeding more refining animals (greater TB%) over the next couple of years, particularly for the Eventing market.

In this regard, Horse Sport Ireland's online database, IHR Online, continues to be developed, with TB% now included in the animal details page and a Hypothetical mating tool which includes TB% in addition to pedigree. This year you can also renew your IHB membership online and register your foal very quickly and simply. By telling us online about your forthcoming foals, the foal kit will arrive at the same time as the foal is due, so when the vet is checking your mare for covering again you can have the marking and registration documentation done at the same time, thereby reducing the cost of another call out.

I look forward to meeting you at the events throughout the year, where I would welcome your feedback. For further information on any of our schemes or services, please do not hesitate to contact the breeding department at Horse Sport Ireland at info@horsesportireland.ie

Irish Sport horses and riders completed a remarkable performance at the FEI/WBFSH World Young Horse Jumping Championships at Lanaken, taking all three medals in the five year-old section. Like vanquishing Musketeers they did us proud as they stood shoulder to shoulder after riding the three Irish Sport Horses; *Uppercourt Cappucino*, *CFS Sir George* and *HHS Vancouver* to Gold, Silver and Bronze ahead of 234 other entries from 30 of the world's show jumping breeding Studbooks.

This is an incredible result for the Irish Sport Horse Studbook, horses,

owners, breeders and their riders. To fill all three places on the podium in a world championship final is phenomenal and has made history for Ireland because for the first time in 26 years of Young Horse Championships a Studbook has gold, silver and bronze in one category.

As their chef d'équipe Comdt. John Ledingham notes "It gave one immense satisfaction seeing riders, who had come through the Irish show jumping ranks from ponies to hardened professionals, winning on Irish horses for breeders and owners who bred or bought the best for competition."

GOLD FOR RICHARD HOWLEY AND UPPERCOURT CAPPUCINO

Gold medal winner *Uppercourt Cappucino* was bred by Limerick's Paul Byrne out of an OBOS Quality dam and by Clement McMahon's good jumping stallion *Pacino*. Paul, who sadly passed away in 2017, was a hugely enthusiastic

Sport Horse breeder. According to Ger O'Neill of Castlefield Stud, where *Cappucino* was produced, "Paul had watched the stallion *Pacino* as he was ridden by Clem as a seven to eight year old and on to a winning Aga Khan team. He just loved him." Sold to Jason Higgins, *Cappucino* came second in the four year old at Millstreet. His performance there was watched on video by Sligo's Richard Howley, who is co-owner with his partner Morgan Kent of HK Horses in Wetherby, England. This was enough for keen eyed Richard to buy him on the spot. His performance at Lanaken proved that to be a good decision.

Uppercourt Cappucino has now been sold on to the world's leading Show Jumping entrepreneur Jan Tops. Ger O'Neill notes that horses trained at Castlefield Stud have now won three gold and two silver medals at the World Young Horse Championships. Ger himself rode to gold for Ireland in both 2016 and 2017. "And all of them are now sold abroad," he notes.

SILVER FOR CSF SIR GEORGE

Tipperary's Darragh Ryan, who previously rode with Greg Broderick and is now with Cian O'Connor, had the first clear for Ireland in this 52 starter 2018 final with Molly Tracy's CSF Sir George. He then set the pace in the 24-horse jump-off with a double clear in a fast 35.34.

Bred by Shane Connolly of Connolly Stud Farm in Galway, CSF Sir George is by the Hannoverian sire Sir Shutterfly who is a full brother to Meredith Michaels Beerbaum's great performing mare Shutterfly. Shane, who is currently breeding from 17 mares, bought CSF Sir George's dam Norrira from D.J. Sullivan of Limerick as a five year old.

By Cavalier Royale and out of a Diamond Lad dam she has been truly successful for him. Among her progeny are Royal Cruz that is jumping in the USA and Mr. Kroon, who also competed at Lanaken. In addition she is the dam of Sera View that went to Swedish show jumper Annika Gustafsson. Annika recently bought her 2018 foal Casco.

Norrira's 2013 son CSF Sir George was sold as a foal at the Cavan Elite. When he was three. He went to Goresbridge and his current owner Molly Tracy paid €42,000 for him there. Shane Connolly intently watched him star for Darragh Ryan at Lanaken and joyfully comments, "It is great to breed something that can compete at that level."

BRONZE FOR HHS VANCOUVER

Neither the Hughes family of

Cuffsgrange, County Kilkenny nor Kildare's Mikey Pender are strangers to medals at Lanaken. In 2016 Mikey rode the Marion Hughes bred Z Seven Caretina to silver in the five year old Championship there. In that same Finals he also won bronze with Z Seven Canya Dance that was bred by Marion's mother Anne. In the 2018 five year old Champion Mikey was on the podium again with another Hughes family product. Going late in the jump off he and HHS Vancouver took bronze once more with a time of 35.75 just .68 of a second behind team mate Richard Howley. Marion says of Mikey, "he is just a fantastic rider and it is just great to have him about the place."

HHS Vancouver has interesting connections with the legend that is the Hughes Family. He is out of a mare La Juanita that Marion bred by her uncle John's stallion Don Juan de la Bouverie. His grand dam was by John's other

great ground breaking sire Cavalier Royale (HOLST). Marion put La Juanita to the other Holsteiner sire Indoctro to produce Vancouver. As always she would not refuse a good offer for him but she notes, "he has blood, is very careful and we would be happy enough to keep him and produce him to a higher level."

So, there we have it! A true Irish success story achieved by superbly talented Irish riders on home bred Irish Sport Horses from knowledgeable breeders who successfully produced the best for the demands of today's very competitive sport.

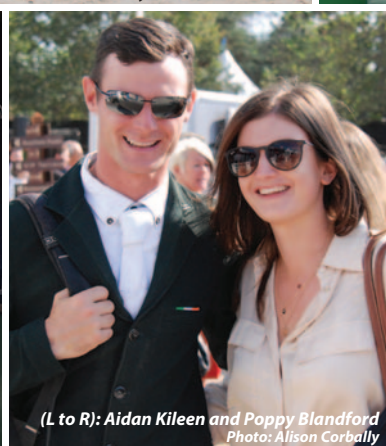

Horse Sport Ireland Coaching Programme - 2019 Developments

The Horse Sport Ireland (HSI) Coaching Programme is designed to provide candidates with a pathway to a career as a successful competition coach. HSI Coaching courses are delivered by professional equestrian tutors and use modern techniques to improve both horses' and riders' performance. Coaching courses are currently delivered across four levels and are accredited by Sport Ireland Coaching; the Irish governing body for coaching in all sports.

2019 will see a complete review of all levels within the programme as well as a complete overhaul of the Level 1 Coach qualification. Assessment at Level 1 is currently paper based, but at the end of this year HSI will introduce a formal, practical coaching assessment procedure at this level. This will raise the standard of coaching available to riders at all levels in Ireland and give coaches a solid foundation to move up the levels within the Coaching Programme.

The programme provides coaches with a framework of progressive exercises to develop horses to compete successfully from grassroots to international level in dressage, show jumping and eventing. The HSI Programme uses modern systematic training methods which allow horses to be produced in the classically correct manner, therefore maximising the resale value.

The HSI Coaching programme is a competition based coaching system and focuses solely on coaching. The programme offers a better understanding of modern competition requirements, coaching skills, technical knowledge and principles of good



communication so they are also suitable for young horse producers, competitors, riding school instructors and freelance competition coaches.

Update on Warmblood Fragile Foal Syndrome in Europe

DISEASE AND INHERITANCE BACKGROUND

During the last years there are more than ten foals reported with symptoms similar to those of Warmblood Fragile Foal Syndrome (WFFS). Probably, there are many more cases not reported due to inexperience in diagnosing the disorder, and yet others may be hidden among unsuccessful pregnancies. Although WFFS seems to be most common in Warmblood breeds, there are a few cases reported also in Thoroughbreds and other breeds.

The syndrome belongs to a group of diseases characterised by congenital fragility of connective tissues, with the most prominent symptoms seen as skin lesions, and joint hyperflexion. The disorder is the result of a mutation in the gene PLOD1 causing a defective structure of collagen fibres; important structures in connective tissues like skin, ligaments, membranes, and blood vessels. A mutation in the corresponding human gene results in the kyphoscoliotic Ehler-Danlos disease (kEDS) characterised by abnormal curvature of the vertebral column, joint laxity, muscle weakness and sometimes rupture of aorta and ocular globe.

The autosomal recessive WFFS mutation is believed to have occurred spontaneously in a founder individual

more than 150 years ago, but few breeders knew about its existence until the spring of 2018 when an affected foal was born in North America. The quick dissemination on social media made the breeders aware of the existence of the disease and more cases were subsequently reported.

Without unbiased calculations it is impossible to know if the frequency of the mutation in Warmblood breeds has increased lately, or if there is solely an effect of breeders being more prone to reporting. An increase in carrier frequency could be a random effect by heavy use of descendants to a founder stallion or if there are unknown advantageous phenotypes associated with the WFFS mutation.

RECENT ADVANCES

Although the disease has been recognised and known for a long time, a genetic test has only been available during the last 15 years, and carrier frequencies are currently surveyed in several Warmblood breeds. Originally, the carrier frequency among horses within German studbooks was

calculated to be around 6-11%. In concordance with this, a more recent study of about 200 German Warmbloods showed a carrier frequency of about 10% (Tetens personal information).

In Swedish Warmbloods the carrier frequency was found to be 7.4% within 511 randomly sampled SWB horses born in 2017.

In February this year, the German company Laboklin calculated a carrier frequency of 15% among horses tested in their commercial laboratory, but this figure may be biased as the samples sent to the laboratory may at a relatively high rate, be from suspected carriers. Also, the Veterinary Genetics Laboratory at US Davis, calculated a carrier frequency of 2-20% among samples of horses belonging to North American Warmblood studbooks. The number of tested samples was quite low, may be biased and should only be seen as an indicators of the level of frequencies. There seems to be about the same frequency of carriers among dressage and show jumping pedigrees, which is in accordance with the belief that the mutation is old.

PRACTICAL ADVICE FOR BREEDERS

Prior to this year's breeding season many studbooks have implemented mandatory WFFS testing of breeding

Figure 1: Inheritance of the WFFS Gene Mutation if both parents are carriers.

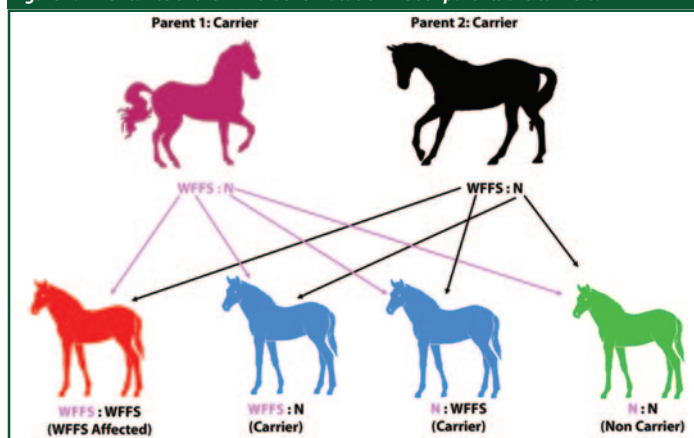
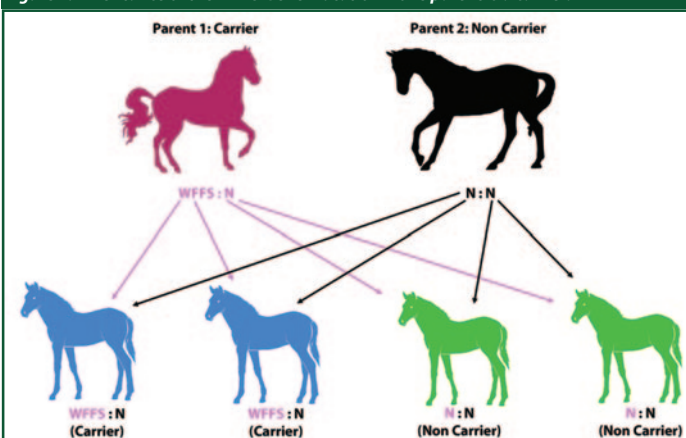


Figure 2: Inheritance of the WFFS Gene Mutation if one parent is a carrier.



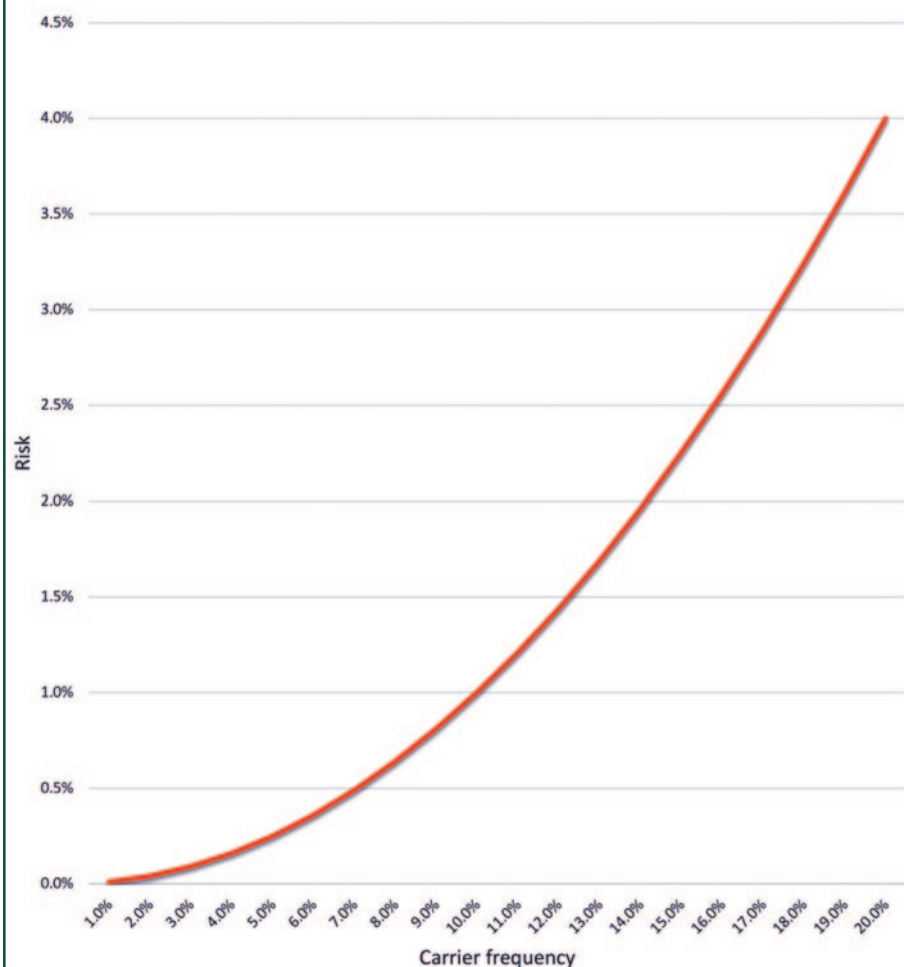
stallions and do publish their status on the respective studbook websites. Publication of such lists should be encouraged as they are very useful for mare owners to make an informed choice of stallions.

Keep in mind that testing your mare is crucial if you have any thoughts of using a WFFS carrier stallion, and there is one easy rule; "Never breed a carrier with a carrier". By instead breeding a carrier with a non-carrier, there is no risk of affected foals, but half of the offspring in such a cross will in theory be carriers. Therefore, to eliminate or reduce the frequency mutation from the population the breeders need to select non-carrier horses for further breeding. To eliminate the risk of having too few non-carriers to choose between for breeding, it is important to monitor so that the carrier frequency does not increase substantially in the breed.

In general, most Warmblood studbooks do not suffer from inbreeding or low genetic variability, why most breeders could be quite selective in not using WFFS carriers, without running the risk of reduction in genetic variability. At the same time there is a risk of losing favourable traits if there is too strong a selection on a single mutation such as PLOD1.

On the other hand, a mutation that seems to be favourable, may as well be associated with another adverse phenotype. Remember that no breed or population will ever be free from all potentially harmful mutations, and the WFFS mutation is just one of all non-favourable mutations in the genome

of a horse.

The risk of breeding a carrier with a carrier for the same mutation is just a matter of how common the mutations are in the breeding population. The difference becomes evident when the mutation is known and there is a genetic test available to guide the

breeders to an informed choice.

There is no right or wrong answer to the question if a breeder should use a carrier in breeding, or not. The breeder should ask him-/herself if the horse was good enough to use in breeding before the WFFS status was known or if there are other better choices of non-carrier

individuals. If there are two equally good stallions, where one of them is a WFFS carrier and the other one is not – then choose the non-carrier. If instead the perfect match, is a WFFS carrier stallion, and there are no other stallions that can match his attributes, then use him.

Thus the WFFS status should be one of all traits to value when choosing the best breeding combination as long as there is no breeding between two carriers.



More Blood?

A consideration for your 2019 Breeding decisions

The Irish Sport Horse (ISH) has led the World Breeding Federation for Studbook rankings in eventing for 22 of the 25 years that the rankings have been in operation. The use of the thoroughbred horse crossed with our core breeds (Irish Draught, Connemara and Thoroughbred (TB)) has been fundamental to this success up to the mid 1980's. However, increasing use of continental crosses, has resulted in a decrease use of Thoroughbred blood in our foal crops in recent years, outlines Alison Corbally. In the late 1980's, 68% of all Irish mares visited Thoroughbred stallions. In 2018, Only 13.4% of mares visited a Thoroughbred stallion and only 6% of mares bred from in the Irish Sport Horse population were Thoroughbred.

For the breeder whose objective is to produce an International showjumper, the focus is clearly on performance dam lines. No longer is it rewarding to breed a mare that has no performance credentials in the first three generations of her dam line to a top performance Approved stallion and receive a consistent economic return



from her progeny. Mares that have jumped a minimum of 1.45m themselves, or families where the 1st, 2nd or 3rd dams have bred several performance competition horses, are the commercial mares for the International show jumping market. A number of Irish breeders are lucky enough to have some of the best performance bloodlines in the country, others have invested in recent years by buying in strong performance dam lines from abroad. Hopefully, being mindful of hereditary soundness traits, such as osteochondrosis when completing these purchases. These mares have been purchased to add the traits of scope and canter to our broodmare population.

However, even for the show jumping market we need to be mindful of

"blood". The top-level Grand Prix and Global Champions Tour horses are blood horses who are required to be quick, gallop and jump to win classes. These horses also need to recover quickly, they also have to cope with significant travel, including air miles during their International careers. The "Blood" for the International show jumper, however, nowadays rarely comes directly from a thoroughbred stallion or mare. The sharpness and "blood" are maintained in the pedigree, by the use of refining animals where the Thoroughbred in is the 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th generation of the pedigrees. For example, Zinius (KWPN) the world's leading ranked show jumping horse in 2018, is 54.49% TB. He hasn't any direct TB in the pedigree until Abgar in the 5th generation and in the 6th generation, he has Furioso, three times and another 9 TB's also recorded in the 6th generation pedigree. Below is a table showing the TB% of the top 8 WBFSH sires in 2018. As you can see Cardento has the highest TB% at 57.42% and has proven to cross very well with Irish mares.

By comparison the Top 8 WBFSH Eventing sires include two Thoroughbreds, Heraldik and Master Imp and the 81% thoroughbred stallion Jaguar Mail.

An examination of the foal crops bred in Ireland 2012 to 2017, shows very concerning trend in the decrease in the percentage of Thoroughbred blood in our foal crops during that period. This is particularly true for the sport of Eventing. In 2018, the ISH foal crop's average Thoroughbred percentage was 36.04%.

From this analysis it can clearly be seen that we are producing very few (5%) foals with more than 75% Thoroughbred blood. At the HSI eventing breeding conference in December 2018, the top-level event riders and trainers emphasised their need for more TB blood.

Padraig McCarthy and Chris Bartle both stressed the need for horses with 75% plus thoroughbred blood for riders to be able to successfully produce them to a top 5 star event horse. These blood horses can withstand the training required and subsequently complete the rigours of the 5 star event much better than horses with less Thoroughbred blood.

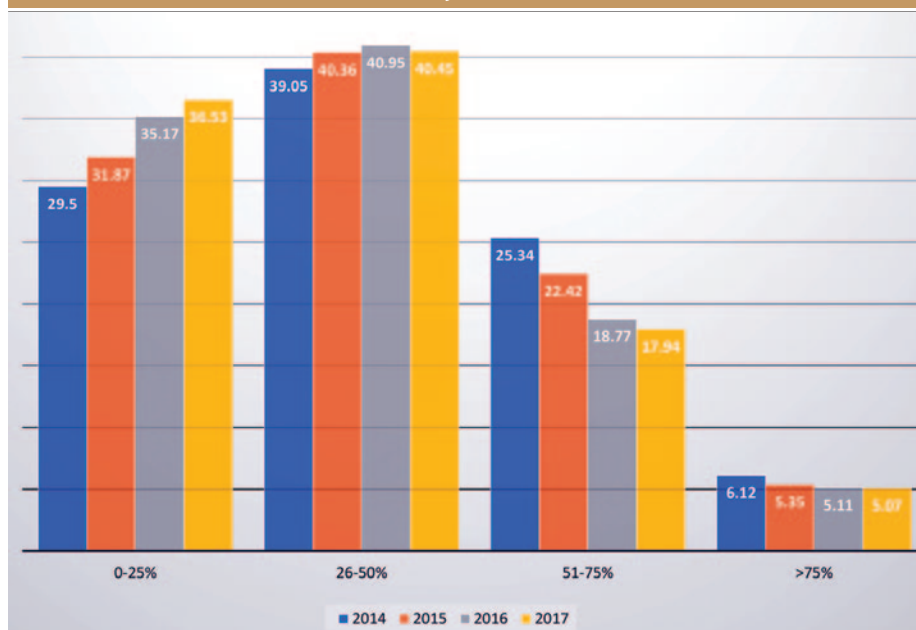
So, is there once again a market opportunity for this type of horse? When Michael Jung was in Ireland last autumn, for the Going for Gold and Monart event horse sales, he too was looking for horses with considerable blood, and he claimed that they are very difficult to source in Europe.

Horse Sport Ireland has introduced some new initiatives in 2019 to encourage the breeder to use an Approved TB stallion and or breed from an inspected TB mare.

1. Grant of €300 for 200 DAFM – inspected mares will be provided on registration of the foal with a DAFM approved studbook in 2020. Breeders who breed performance mares which meet the performance criteria or mares that have produced performance progeny and register those foals in 2020 with more than 70% TB blood in any DAFM studbook, will receive €300, up to a limit of 200 performance mares.
2. The HSI Foal Championship for 2019 will also reward Eventing direction foals with more than 60% Thoroughbred percentage.

These initiatives have been enthusiastically supported by the Registered Stallion Owners Association who also recognise the need for more TB blood in the population. The aim is to encourage the use of Approved TB stallions and inspected TB mares by

providing a financial incentive to those breeders who do so. This is not an easy task for either breeders or the studbook alike to source suitable TB animals, such is the strength in demand for them in racing markets. Further, given that few Thoroughbred mares or stallions compete in sport it is not easy to determine which may provide jumping ability in their progeny. Or at a very least, select those that will not take the jump away from the pedigree. Therefore, consideration should also be given to high Thoroughbred percentage Sport Horse mares and stallions (such as Hand In Glove and Cardento and younger horse with similarly high TB%). By crossing two high percentage TB individuals we can also increase the TB% within the population. It is noteworthy that those TB stallions that have been presented for the HSI inspection process have been loose jumped and linear profiled which is published in the Stallion Book and videos on the HSI website, provides useful information.

As a useful tool for breeders HSI have included the TB% on the horse details page and the pedigree pages of the **IHR Online** database and HSI have also

included a hypothetical mating tool where you can test cross your mare with a number of your short-listed stallions to determine the potential foals Thoroughbred percentage.

By creating an account with IHR online you will have access to a suite of valuable tools to commence your breeding selections research. In addition, this year you can also renew your IHB membership online and register your foal very quickly and simply. By telling us online about your forthcoming foals, the foal kit will arrive at the same time as the foal is due, so when the vet is checking your mare for covering again you can have the marking and registration documentation done at the same time, thereby reducing the cost of another call out. Loose Jumping Championships See an Increase in Entries for 2018

Horse Sport Ireland held 3 loose jumping competitions for 3 & 4 year old horse and pony fillies in the winter of 2018. These championships aimed to identify and showcase young fillies that would be suitable for use as top-class broodmares of the future. For the first time, a pony championship was included in these competitions.

Each animal's conformation, movement and athleticism was assessed by an expert panel of judges, which included international show jumpers such as Captain Geoff Curran and Francis Connors. To determine the overall winner, scores were given based on the animal's performance in each section. The championships were well supported by Irish breeders with over 120 animals competing over the three days.

Uniquely at these events breeders/producers also had the option to have their fillies partake in ISH & ISP Mare Selections. This allowed breeders to have their mares upgraded to "Select" status in the studbook, should the mare meet the minimum requirements for conformation and movement. These mares could also partake in the optional athleticism component of selection, from which they can achieve 1* status. The majority of breeders participating in the Loose Jumping Championships also chose to have their filly partake in the Mare Selections on the same day.

Loose jumping judge, breeder and international show jumper Vincent Byrne said: "I am very impressed with this loose jumping initiative by Horse Sport Ireland. Having previously judged this competition last year I am happy to see the increase in both numbers and quality of 3 year olds especially. I think it is important for all breeders and producers to follow these classes to help them to see what our competition is like for the future and if our produce is meeting market requirements for both show jumping and eventing."

Breeder of the 4 year old Champion at Cavan Equestrian Centre Joseph Gallagher said: "I entered my mare *Kittens* (ISH) in this championship for the last two years. As a 3 year old she came 3rd and this year as a 4 year old

was champion in her section. I believe that these championships provide a great opportunity to showcase my young horses and also gives breeders a chance to compare their young stock against their peers. It helps me to determine if I will sell or keep on my young horses. I have had three offers for *Kittens* (ISH) since the championship, but I plan to hold onto her for the next year or two. I was also delighted to have the opportunity to have her linear profiled and inspected at the competition as I believe she has the potential to be a top-class competition horse and broodmare of the future. It's great to see that HSI is supporting these young horse initiatives".

The Final of the Young Handler Championship took place in September 2018 at the National Ploughing Championships in Co. Offaly. This was the first time that an equestrian showing competition had taken place at the show and it provided a great stage on which the young handlers could showcase their horses and ponies.

The aim of this championship was to assist in the development of the skills of young handlers to prepare and present horses for show and sale. This championship was open to any young handler under the age of 25 that exhibited a horse or pony registered in a DAFM/EU studbook. Young Handlers were divided into one of two age categories – Junior: 14 – 18 years and Senior: 19 – 25 years. As part of the competition they were asked to show their animal in hand, create a short sales video for their animal and also to research a well-known stallion.

The handlers competing at the final qualified during the summer months at one of the 5 qualifiers which took place across each of the 5 IHB regions.

Andrew Hughes (Judge) said: *"It is a fantastic initiative by HSI and hopefully everyone learned something from it. The horsemanship on the day was of a very high standard. I think there is room for improvement on the video section, perhaps education days would help to raise the standards in this area."*

Tiernan Gill (Judge) said: *"The series was a fantastic way in which to see horses at the National Ploughing Championships. It provides great exposure for the young handlers. I would love to see more equine involvement at the National Ploughing Championships in the future."*

JUNIOR DIVISION:

In a strongly contested Junior Division it was Katie Dineen that took the Championship title. The Reserve Championship went to David Brown.

We didn't expect feedback that a number of the participants have reported, that as a result of this initiative and the skills they have acquired, they are now considering pursuing sport horse breeding and production as a career path. Many of the participants at the qualifiers have already signed up to participate in the Irish Sport Horse/Teagasc Young Breeders Programme with the possibility of competing internationally."*

As with any new initiative, we will review it in detail this autumn and will make amendments and improvements for 2019. I would like to congratulate all the winners and participants alike, and to thank the dedicated parents who facilitated their teenager's participation this year."

Irish Horse Board: Changes to IHB Shareholder renewals

Following the announcement at the Irish Horse Board Cooperative Society Ltd (IHB) AGM in December 2018, the IHB Shareholder renewals process will move to an online platform from 2019 onwards. This development is designed to deliver administrative efficiencies within the system for all stakeholders.

There will also be a change to the pricing structure of IHB annual shareholder renewals. From 2019, IHB Shareholder renewal fees will be set at €35 per annum – an increase of €10 from the original €25 per annum in situ since 1994. However, in an effort to encourage IHB Shareholders to adopt and use the new IHB online renewal system, a reduced rate of €25 will still apply for all such online renewals completed prior to 31st May 2019.

IHB Shareholders opting to pay their annual renewal fees after the cut-off date of 31st May 2019 will now pay renewal fees of €30 per annum online. This means that only those IHB Shareholders who do not use the new online system (instead remaining with the older paper-based system) will now be charged €35 per annum irrespective of the date of payment of the IHB renewal.

IHB shareholders/members will continue to enjoy discounted Irish Horse Register (IHR) transaction fees (typically some €37 discount per transaction); have access to the IHR Online; will be eligible to receive free Horse Sport Ireland publications (Stallion Book, Foal Book, Breeders' Magazines); may avail of 40% discount on Irish Horse Gateway membership fees; and retain voting rights for the annual IHB elections and at the IHB AGM.

Finally, any individual wishing to become an IHB shareholder may now also do so online.

Norman Allen said: "The two winners in the show jumping section were exceptional. The filly in particular has an excellent pedigree. Her dam

Rincarina was a prolific winner at 1.60m and her sire *For Pleasure* is producing top-class foals. I see no reason why this filly wouldn't go to the highest levels of competition with the scope, movement and attitude she showed. The colt foal had big loose movement with plenty of scope. He could also be a top level competition horse in the future. I believe that this Championship is a great initiative from HSI and gives spectators the opportunity to see some of the best foals in the country".

ISH Young Breeders National Competition and Breeders Forum

The 2019 ISH Young Breeders National Competition took place on January

26th at Ravensdale Equestrian Centre in Dundalk, Co Louth jointly organised by Teagasc and Horse Sport Ireland. The event was generously supported by Connollys Red Mills, and Horseware Ireland.

A dedicated and focused group of 14-25 year olds demonstrated their skills as horse handlers, their knowledge in assessment of conformation and athleticism traits of horses; while also completing a theory test on equine health and welfare; nutrition; stable management and the sport.

Highly respected and experienced industry professionals Jack Doyle (Coach and ex international showjumper), Andrew Hughes (Ennisnag Stud), Philip Scott (Barnfield Equestrian) and Richard Sheane (Cooley Farm) not only assessed the skills of the handlers, but set the standards for their younger counterparts to match in the assessment of the horses. The day doubled up as a forum for breeders to learn from and interact with the judges on the traits and requirements for the sports of show jumping and eventing in relation to breeding stock and horses for market. A superb selection of sport horses were professionally presented by Thomas Quigley from Co Carlow providing excellent subjects for discussion.

The competition itself acts as the first step in the qualification process for team participants to represent the Irish Sport Horse Studbook at the World Breeding Federation for Sport Horses (WBFSH) Young Breeders World Championship 2019 to be held in Stadl Paura Austria from the 19th to 22nd July 2019.

The winners will be joined by seniors Kevin Finn, Kathryn Jones, Nicole Groyer, Sarah Brashaw, Conor Mahon and juniors Ellie Duggan, Edward Hennessy, Laura Dennehy, Katie Dinneen and Tara Timlin to battle it out over a further four selection days in March and April to identify four 16-19 year olds and four 20-25 year olds who will travel to Austria in July 2019 to represent the ISH Studbook at the International Young Breeders World Championships.

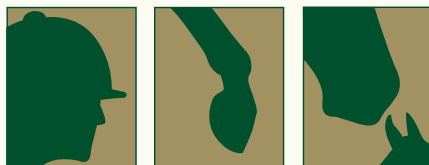

Riders call for more Thoroughbred Blood In top-level Eventers

At HSI International Breeding Conference And Breeders Awards

The HSI International Breeding Conference took place in the Keadeen Hotel, Co Kildare on Thursday, 13th December, 2018. The 300 participants heard from a line-up of national and international speakers who each provided food for thought regarding breeding the top Sport Horses of the future.

THE SPEAKERS INCLUDED:

- **Christopher Bartle**, a previous winner of Badminton Horse Trials, former National Coach to the German Olympic 3 Day Event Team and currently the British Eventing Team's High-Performance Coach.
- **Padraig McCarthy**, an Irish Olympic Three-Day Event rider and most famously, team and individual Silver Medallist at the World Equestrian Games (WEG) this year.
- **Jens Meyer**, founder of 'Hengststation Jens Meyer' and breeder and producer of top level Show jumping and eventing horses.
- **Dr Alan Fahey**, Associate Dean of International Programmes and Associate Professor of Animal Breeding in the School of Agriculture and Food Science at UCD.
- **Tiernan Gill**, Managing Director of the Gill Group, and producer of top level horses.
- **Bert Van den Oetelaar**, a very successful sport horse agent from the Netherlands.
- **William Micklem**, a world-renowned coach and author and breeder of sport horses.

One message that came out loud and clear was the need for thoroughbred blood in event horses competing at the top end of the sport. In Ireland we have the advantage of having some of the best Thoroughbreds in the world, bred and standing in Ireland. The trend of breeders worldwide however, is to place less interest on the use of Thoroughbreds and use crossbred horses instead. However, if this process continues indefinitely without sufficient injection of TB, it will result in an overall loss of Thoroughbred influence in the overall sport horse population.

The message from the top-level event riders presenting and in the audience was that they are finding it

more and more difficult worldwide, to find horses with sufficient Thoroughbred blood, to be produced and stay sound enough to be competitive at 3 and 4* level eventing. It is getting more difficult to source these horses. This is a clear message for breeders – more Thoroughbred percentage please.

The importance of more Thoroughbred blood was discussed by all the speakers during their talks. WEG team silver medallist and silver individual winner, Pdraig McCarthy, got the ball rolling saying he believes a high percentage of Thoroughbred blood “must be up there to ensure top level performers.”

McCarthy told the Conference: “In my own breeding, we are going back to blood. Last year we went to Slyguff Stud’s Pointilliste (TB) and Nazar (TB). We saw Pointilliste at the Croker Cup at the Dublin Horse Show and thought he looked like an athletic horse. He looks like a horse that gives jump or at least does not take it away, but of course it depends on your mare.”

McCarthy discussed how he recently met top German eventer Michael Jung after his recent horse-buying trip to Monart and Goresbridge ‘Go For Gold Sale’. “Michael told me he came to Ireland to find a horse that can win at four and five-star level and to do that, he needs Thoroughbred in the first two generations and he cannot find that in Germany.”

Christopher Bartle emphasised that breeders should think ahead: “We have to learn from the past but at the same time very much think about the future as we make our plans for the years ahead. We are not so very far away from LA (2028), this is not a long time in the life of a horse.”

Bartle talked about how the sport has changed and how every discipline has transitioned from amateur to professional over the years. He also discussed how investment and competition within the sport has changed. He noted how events such as WEG, the Olympic Games, Global Champions Tour and Badminton Horse Trials have grown in recent years. He believes that this specialisation has influenced the direction of breeding over the years and has led to changes in the type of horses required for each discipline. The way the sport is conducted has also changed hugely

with new tests and competition formats. Importantly he questioned whether breeders affect the direction of the sport or vice versa.

The annual Horse Sport Ireland Breeders Awards also took place during the conference. The awards were presented to 25 breeders whose horses and ponies achieved outstanding results throughout the year. The award

winners included the breeders of the Irish Sport Horse medal winning horses at the WFBSH Young Horse Championships at Lanaken and Le Lion d'Angers 2018. Outstanding achievement awards were presented to **Michael Hughes** of the Irish Shows Association and to **James Flynn** the producer of Agha Khan winner *Heather Honey* (ISH).

Remembering Midland Breeder Harold McGahern

The late Harold McGahern was Granard farmer, Rural Science teacher, graduate of Gormanstown College, family man, school friend of Eddie Macken, respected RDS steward but in addition he was a dedicated and knowledgeable Irish horse breeder. Nor was he a quiet silent one. No! Harold had his say on committees and sometimes in acerbic letters to the equestrian press. But behind it all was his desire to see Ireland produce show jumpers and eventers that would make us proud. From the time that he had been chosen valedictorian for his 1972 class at Gormanstown College, Harold was always willing to stand and say his sensible piece. "I have never been afraid to voice my opinions ever since," he once told me.

FINDING A MARE

While still in College, Harold caught the horse breeding bug when minding a foaling mare for his family's neighbour Robin Stevenson. Then and there he determined to buy a mare of his own and to earn the purchase money he headed off on a Summer J1

Visa to the USA in 1971. The result was a good Durantus filly out of a *Blue Cliff* dam that eventually bred *Firkin* on which he won an Irish Eventing Championship at Punchestown.

BREEDING PERFORMERS

From that time on, despite a busy life as family man, farmer and teacher; he bred at least one foal a year. Always a man to think outside the box, he did not stay with just one stallion and was eventually convinced to use some continental bloodlines. Down the years he put mares to the likes of *Diamant de Semilly*, *Lancelot*, *Mister Blue*, along with Irish based *Touchdown*, *VDL Douglas* and *Cavalier Royale*.

Among his best known products was the lovely 1991 Traditional Irish mare *Rincoola Abu* by *Cruising* out of a *Clover Hill* dam. Captain Gerry Flynn rode her on the Army team and one of his proudest possessions was a picture

of this mare festooned by her medals won in International competition. She was on winning Irish teams at places like Falsterbo and Athens. Another successful one from his stables was *Will Wimble* by James Kernan's *Touchdown* out of a *Roselier* (TB) dam. This gelding won an Irish championship for Alexander Butler and also took the international Grand Prix at Balmoral.

PROMOTING THE SPORT

In addition to his breeding efforts, Harold McGahern also poured a great deal of time into promoting equestrian sport. He was a founder of the Longford Pony Club. Along with the late Ronnie MacMahon he also initiated the visionary Future Event Horse League (FEHL). His mantra was "we should cater to our strengths as a breeding nation."

He lived by that himself and we are a bit the weaker by his untimely passing.

Having the Connemara, the perfect performance pony, as the cornerstone of Irish sport pony breeding, is a natural asset and native blood, plus performance and thoroughbred lines, shone throughout the pedigrees of the ponies that brought home a slew of silver medals from the 2018 championships.

That's exactly what *Cavalidam* did last year. More highlights included a FEI Jumping Ponies Grand Prix victory at Stuttgart and on the winning Nations Cup team at Opglabbeek. In 2017, she won the Mechelen Grand Prix for previous rider Seamus Hughes Kennedy, who started off her career.

Cuffesgrange Sport Horses is a Sheehan family effort, involving Eamon, Ronan and Eamon Jnr and amongst their four broodmares is *Cavalidam's* full-sister. The family have bred several four-star event horses, including Tim Bourke's Kentucky Horse Trials cross-country specialist *Luckaun Quality* and *Fernhill Quality*, plus the multiple European medallist pony, *Cuffesgrange Little Ric*.

In 2003 Paddy bought the coloured mare *Tena Princess* locally in Enniscrone and covered her with the Touchdown

son, *Grand Touch*, the following year to produce *Colour Me Fancy*. Michael, Paddy's brother, later bought the skewbald filly and the Murphy family have followed *Colour Me Fancy's* progress, right up to her team silver medal.

Cloughreagh Charlie is a veteran of two European Championships for the Love family, having previously competed individually with Timmy and on last year's silver medal team with Holly. Like many Irish cross-country machines with their famous 'fifth leg', that phase is 'Charlie's strongest and thrives on competition, a trait inherited from his dam *Rathkenny Honey Bee*.

A prolific winner in her Pony Club days and described as "clever, incredibly light and athletic" by Sophie, she selected the *Ballydonagh Casanova* son *Westside Mirah* to cover her with due to his easygoing attitude, superb jump and good bone. *Rathkenny Honey Bee* bred two foals by this *Ballydonagh Casanova* son; the first *Cloughreagh Sirah* now competes in England and 'Charlie' is the second.

Cloughreagh Charlie (ISH) (TIH)

Wildewood Storm is the second of *Westside Mirah's* progeny and another Meath-bred pony on last year's team. Deirdre felt his 135cms dam *Mercury* merited breeding from, due to her exceptional jump, speed and bravery and that most of *Storm's* ability comes from this "remarkably talented" mare.

Another to select the late *Westside Mirah* for his temperament and rideability, the resultant *Wildewood Storm* was originally produced to international level by Deirdre's daughter Caoimhe Eivers, a keen eventing and tetrathlon competitor.

Determined not to sell 'Storm', Deirdre was lucky to "find Carol Swan and Harry, a unique team" to fulfil the pony's European potential. Another proud breeder saluted at the Horse Sport Ireland Breeders Awards last December, she has an exciting prospect in the pipeline in *Wildewood Silvaroo*. *Storm's* full-sister *Wildewood Flight* produced this two-year-old filly by the *Master Imp* son, *Jackaroo*.

Little Miss Fernhill

Although the O'Sullivans had previously bred American event rider Molly Hooper Bull's four-star horse *Kiltartan*, *Little Miss Fernhill* is the only pony bred by the Cork family. She is the third of the 2018 team by a Connemara stallion and the decision to use a

Connemara on *Buster Lass*, "a quite small and light-boned" mare from the *Busted* line, was a wise one.

Having spotted *Royal Sparrow* in the All Irelander at Millstreet, the O'Sullivans were impressed by his performance and conformation.

Little Miss Fernhill has had a string of talented riders, from being hunted as a four-year-old by Louise Coleman, then evented to Novice level and schooled by Angela and Patrick Dennehy. She was sold as an eight-year-old to Carol Gee and added to the impressive Irish medal tally at European level with Sophie Foyle.

Irish Sport Horses Triumph at the FEI WBFSH Young Event Horse Championships at Le Lion d'Angers

The Irish Sport Horse Studbook won the overall title for the second consecutive year at the FEI WBFSH World Breeding Eventing Championships for Young Horses at Le Lion d'Angers in France. In addition Irish Sport Horses also won three individual medals from a possible six.

Great Britain's Tom Jackson rode the Irish Sport Horse *Capels Hollow Drift* (ISH) to claim individual Silver in the 7 Year Old Section. *Capels Hollow Drift* (ISH) was bred in County Clare by Jeanette Glynn.

Irish Sport Horses also claimed both Silver and Bronze medals in the Six Year Old section. Silver went to *Emerald Jonny* (ISH) and Great Britain's *Piggy French*. *Emerald Jonny* (ISH) was bred by Donnacha Quinn in Co Mayo. The USA's Liz Halliday-Sharp and Irish Sport Horse *Cooley Moonshine* (ISH) won Bronze ensuring two of the three medal slots in this section were filled by Irish Sport Horses. *Cooley Moonshine* (ISH) was bred in Wexford by Michael J Kavanagh. The full breeding details of the medal winning horses are listed below:

Emerald Jonny (ISH) - by *Waldo Van Dungen* (KWPN) and out of *Z Royalty Van De Heernis* (KWPN), by *Rubels* (OLD). Bred by Donnacha Quinn, Co Mayo. Owned by Thomas March.

Cooley Moonshine (ISH) – by *Cobra* (HOLST) and out of *Kilpatrick Duchess* (ISH), by *Kings Master* (ISH) [TIH]. Bred by Michael J Kavanagh, Co Wexford. Owned by Deborah Hall.

The top placed Irish riders competing on Irish Sport Horses were Clare Abbot riding *Jewelent* (ISH) finishing in 8th place and Cathal Daniels riding *OLS King Aragon* (ISH) finishing in 10th place. *Jewelent* (ISH) is a 6 year old gelding by *Valent* (KWNP) and out of *Bellaney Jewel* (TB)(IRL) by *Roselier* (TB), that was bred in County Armagh by J. W. Rosbotham. *OLS King Aragon* (ISH) is a 7 year old gelding by *Samgemjee* [ISH] and out of *Just Beauty Queen* [ISH] by *Seamanship* (TB), that was bred in County Kildare by Kieran Connors.

In 1990 we purchased a 3-year-old RID mare, *Nellies Version* by *Silver Sam* RID, who was in foal to *Shauna's Diamond* RID. In 2007 *Bowland Be Lucky*, a great granddaughter of *Nellies*, was put in foal to *Alice's Diamond Slipper* and produced a pale chestnut colt that would exceed all our expectations.

Bowland Lucky Slipper, known to his friends as 'Louis', soon started to turn grey and from being a somewhat plain foal he soon changed and the ugly duckling turned into a swan. Once gelded he was shown lightly in-hand with considerable success notably winning and being made Champion at the Great Yorkshire Show and taking the Supreme Championship at the Irish Draught Annual Breed Show.

Louis then started his career under saddle, and went from strength to strength. He is a natural show-off, who loves people looking at him, and he has a presence and attitude that say 'look at me'. He won the Irish Draught Ridden Class at the Great Yorkshire and was made the Ridden Champion at the Annual Irish Draught Breed Show twice.

Louis was also competing successfully in British Dressage and it was at one of these competitions that he caught the eye of professional producer

Magnus Nicholson. We then continued to produce *Louis* at home and Magnus took the ride on *Louis* in Heavyweight Hunter classes. As some people said – it was a match made in heaven putting two show-offs together!

The partnership was a real success, and one of the many highlights was the pair of them taking the overall Hunter Championship at The Great Yorkshire Show. They also qualified, and were placed in the top five, at The Horse of the Year Show every year being placed second in the Heavyweight Hunters in 2016.

However as breeders and stallion owners of Irish Draughts, winning the Blue Chip and IDHS (GB) £2000 Challenge Championship at our Annual Breed Show was literally a dream come true. We were so proud when one of the judges said: "he epitomises everything that is good about the breed, he oozes quality and gives a fantastic ride."

Hopefully, following in *Louis's* footsteps will be *Bowland Jasper*, who is out of a full sister to *Louis* by *Silver Jasper* (ID C1). He has had a great start to his career winning last year as a 2-year-old at The Great Yorkshire Show, and taking the Moorbennhall Irish Draught Championship at our Annual Breed Show.
